With the Charles Francis Adams House on Fairhaven Hill, #900 Tanglewood Drive is the earliest of the great Federal/Colonial Revival riverfront houses built in Concord. It is a large, complex 2 1/2- and 3-story building with a hipped roof. It consists of a square core, which faces southeast toward the river, a 2-story north wing, and short southwest wing. A porte-cochere shelters the main entry, which has a large recessed and sidellighted paneled door. A Tuscan-columned porch shelters another entry on the southwest side, and a rear entrance on the northwest rear has a sidelighted and balconied lobby entrance, adorned with unfluted pilasters. A continuous wooden deck/terrace nearly encircles the building, linking the entrances. Most of the windows are 6-over-6-sash, with heavily molded crowns. A large Palladian window is located on the rear elevation, and a one-story polygonal bay window projects from the east side. The architectural trim, typical of the Federal Revival, includes a modillioned cornice at the rooflines.

This magnificent house is significant as one of the first two large country estates "not for farming" built in Concord. The other was the Charles Francis Adams House on Fairhaven Hill. Both were constructed in 1899, and they ushered in an era of country-estate building on Concord's hills and overlooking her waterways that lasted through the 1930's.

Many of the country estates were established on parts of some of Concord's most historic farms. In this case, the Misses Elizabeth and Emma Frances Williams bought the old eighteenth-century Woodis and Isaac Lee Farm on the Fitchburg Turnpike in about 1899. They built this house on the bluff overlooking Fairhaven Bay for their own residence, where it became known as a "home of boundless hospitality and charm." They also probably built the beautiful horse barn that still exists today west of the old Lee farmhouse at 509 Garfield Road. They hired a manager, who lived in the old farmhouse, to run the farm.

Elizabeth Williams died in 1916, and by 1925 the house and farm had been acquired by Richard Fessenden. The Fessenden family owned the property through the middle of this century.

It also meets Criterion C as a excellent example of a large three-story Federal Revival house. It possesses integrity of design, location, setting, materials, and workmanship, feeling and association.
